1: What was your first contact with the Harajuku subculture? H: At the beginning I didn't know the style was called harajuku. My first contact honestly was through anime and manga. After that I did further research about Japan and watched several documentaries, eventually ending up going to conventions and events.

1: How was your first convention experience?

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H: Hmmm... let's see. I think I was 13 and i just went there with a friend and we were like "Woa, this is amazing". We were obsessed with everything. Honestly, thinking back at it now, it was really small, more like a social gathering rather than an organised convention. The event itself was held in the backyard of a small building and it consisted of just a few stands and a stage, where some groups of young people were dancing and at times doing karaoke competitions. I had a really good time there. Yea, it was quite a small event and we were all so very young, but I really enjoyed it.

1: Why did you choose this particular subculture to begin with? H: Ummm... I just started trying a lot of different subcultures. At the beginning, a subculture which caught my attention was Visual Kei. I really loved it 'cause it was edgy and... I don't know... I just really loved it. Then I started looking at more colourful things such as decorra. My first attempt at doing decorra was not really what I'd call good. J: Ok, let's get to the last question. Any advice for the newcomers to harajuku? H: Hmmm... I would tell them not to stress about getting the clothes from big brands or buying clothes online. A lot of people say "Oh, but I don't know where to get those clothes". Just go to thrift stores, street markets or charity shops and you'll be certain to find a lot of things You just have to be creative and dress as you like. That all there is to it.
